

#### "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God."

In the history of Christianity throughout the world, people of faith have been persecuted and rounded up for mass murder. From 1900-1999 more people were martyred than in the all of the 1000 years before combined.

Many clergy and other people of faith faced the guillotine of the French Revolution. Others were carted off to the gulags of Siberia as fallout from the Russian Revolution. Many priests and other people of faith faced the firing squads of the Mexican Revolution. Other countless millions were slaughtered by Mao Zedong and the Khmer Rouge.

During all of this time, people of faith in the United States lead, for the most part, untroubled lives. There was a cooperative relationship between the Church and State. Americans could go about their business and attend whatever church suited them. We have come to expect that being people of faith and freely practicing our faith, which is guaranteed by the First Amendment, would be a given.

But some cracks are starting to appear. I know from experience with the students I used to work with during my 19 years as chaplain of the Catholic Campus Center here in Hays, that Catholic students were regularly ridiculed for their faith. Others were forced to defend positions that were contrary to their faith in class assignments. Not to do so would lower their grade. One student was denied entrance into KU Medical School for openly stating in an interview that he was opposed to abortion.

The bottom line is that centuries of the free practice of our faith as Americans has dulled our sensitivity to the fact that "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." We think that suffering for our faith is something that only the Apostles of old or people in Communist countries would have to endure.

The noose around the necks of people of faith is tightened every so slowly with words like "tolerance," "inclusion." "diversity," etc. The nature of faith is that has always been at odds with the culture-at-large. While we enjoy a great degree of religious freedom at this point, we dare not become complacent and assume it will always be such.

# **Gospel Meditations**


I've always found it amazing that Jesus never says to his disciples the straightforward and bumper stickery words "I love you" or "I will always love you" (a la Dolly Parton's song). Why doesn't Jesus say, "I love you"?

Well, actually he does, but in particular ways. He says, "As the Father loves me, so I love you" (John 15:9) thereby rooting his love for us in the space of the Holy Trinity. This week he commands, "Love another as I have loved you" (John 13:34). He presents his love for us as a completed action which continues into the present moment. How has he loved us? By becoming one of us, one with us, and finally giving his life for us in his suffering on the cross. We weren't there when he did that, but neither were his Apostles (except one). Still, that action is his great "I love you" to us.

His love is also hedged in a command: "Love one another." So how can we practically follow it? The great St. John XXIII wrote in his diary that each day he followed this rule: "Only for today, I will do one good deed and not tell anyone about it." The hidden nature of a good deed is a sign that it is truly loving. This week, take on St. John XXIII's practical method of following Jesus' great commandment of love. It's a splendid way to say, "I love you."

### The Tradition of Fasting

#### **Communion Fasting**

#### **Question:**

Do we need to fast for one hour before Mass, or one hour before communion?

#### Answer:

#### Yes

The practice of fasting before receiving the Eucharist is a centuries-old act of devotion that was once very different than it is today. In the 1917 Code of Canon Law, for example, anyone who wanted to receive the Eucharist had to fast from midnight until the time of communion (even water and medications were forbidden). Over the following decades, the rules for the eucharistic fast were relaxed, first by Pope Pius XII and, later, by Pope Saint Paul VI.

The current Code of Canon Law (1983) states very clearly: "A person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before holy communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine" (Canon 919, §1). And, in the case of those who are ill and the elderly, the rules are even more accommodating, "The elderly, the infirm, and those who care for them can receive the Most Holy Eucharist even if they have eaten something within the preceding hour" (Canon 919, §3).

So, if we strictly follow the "letter of the law," the fast is calculated from the time of Holy Communion and not the start of Mass. However, when we remember why we fast — it is a reminder of the deeper hungers of the spirit that our physical thirst or hunger symbolize — we see that the issue is much bigger than simply fulfilling what is called for by Church Law and tradition. Joining fasting to our prayers and reflection before Mass is an opportunity to really center ourselves and to prepare our minds, hearts, and bodies to welcome the One we receive in the Eucharist.

### The Catholic Steward



Today's readings on this fifth Sunday of Easter contain inspiring but challenging messages for us Christian stewards.

The Gospel from John includes this well-known verse: "My children...I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another."

What a succinct description of a stewardship way of life. It sounds so simples. But simple does not necessarily mean easy.

How exactly is Jesus Calling us to love? As He, Himself loved. Jesus loved (and loves) by serving us and by making a sacrifice of His very life for us. That is a tall order.

And amid the inevitable challenging moments this way of life entails we can be assured that the Lord who loves us so much that He died for us and established the Eucharist to be our strength and nourishment, is right here with us every step of the way.

As we face the hardships that come with living as Christian stewards, we can continue to rejoice in the wonder of the Resurrection this Easter season, finding great joy in following in our Lord's footsteps and in loving as He loves.
