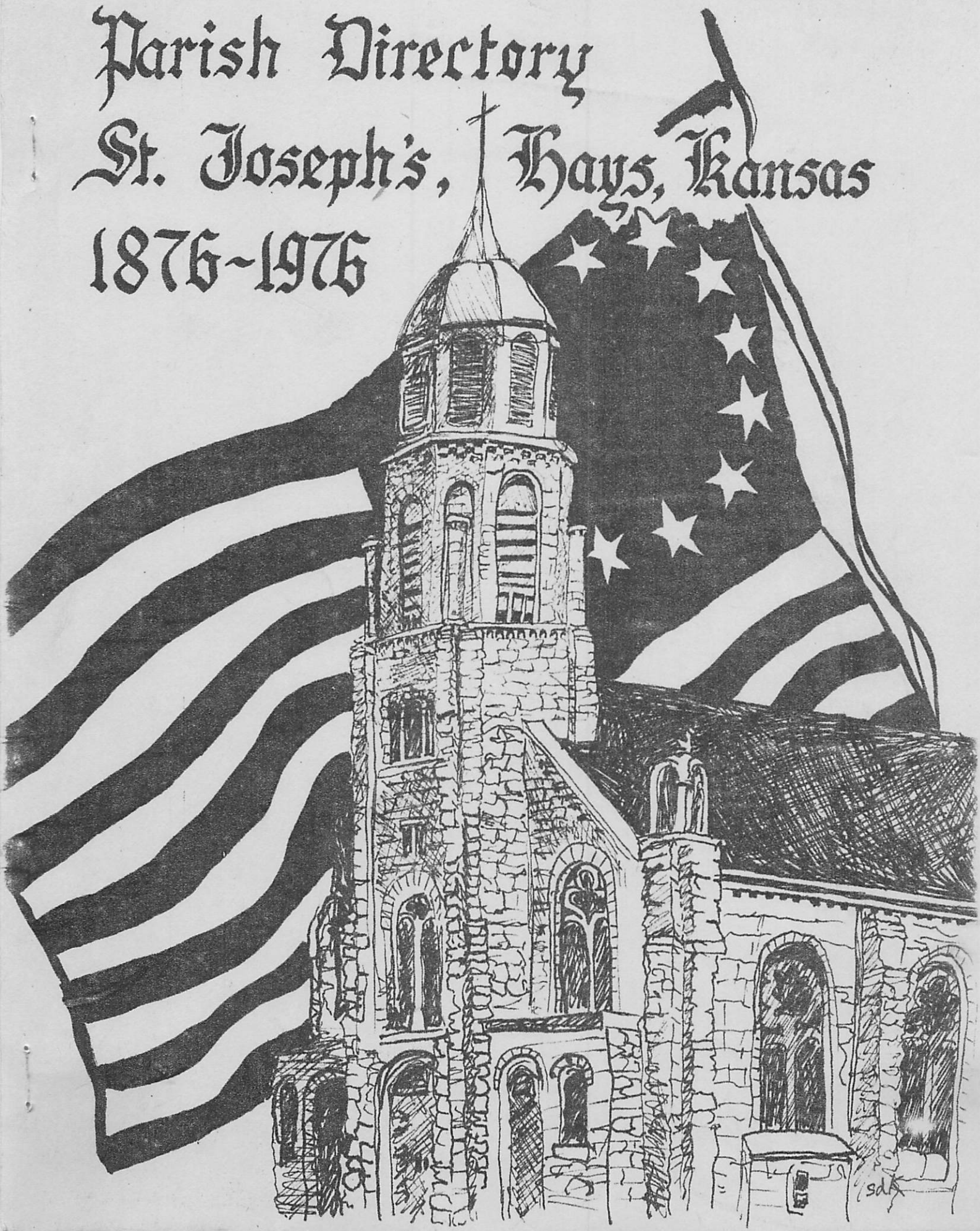


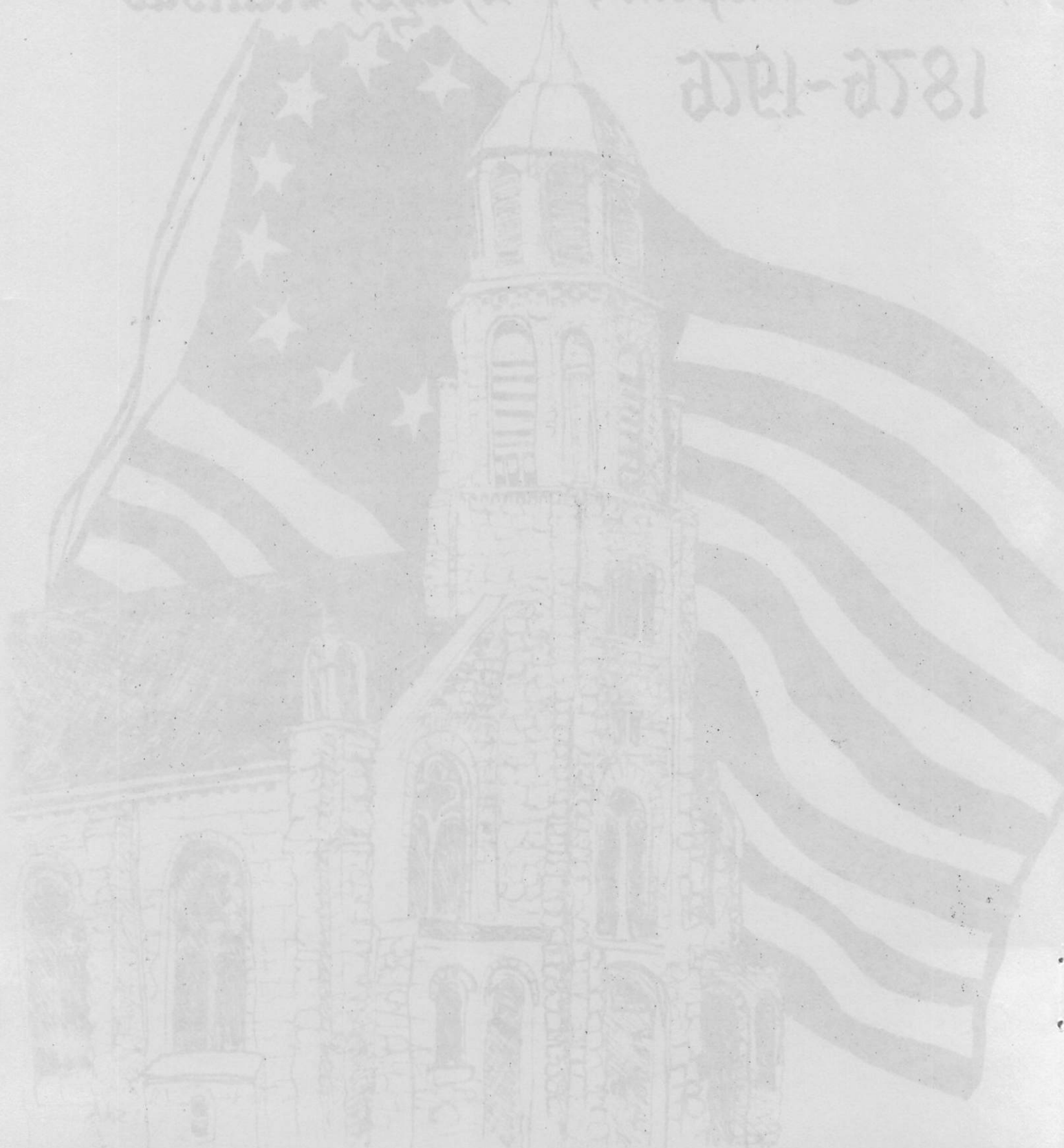

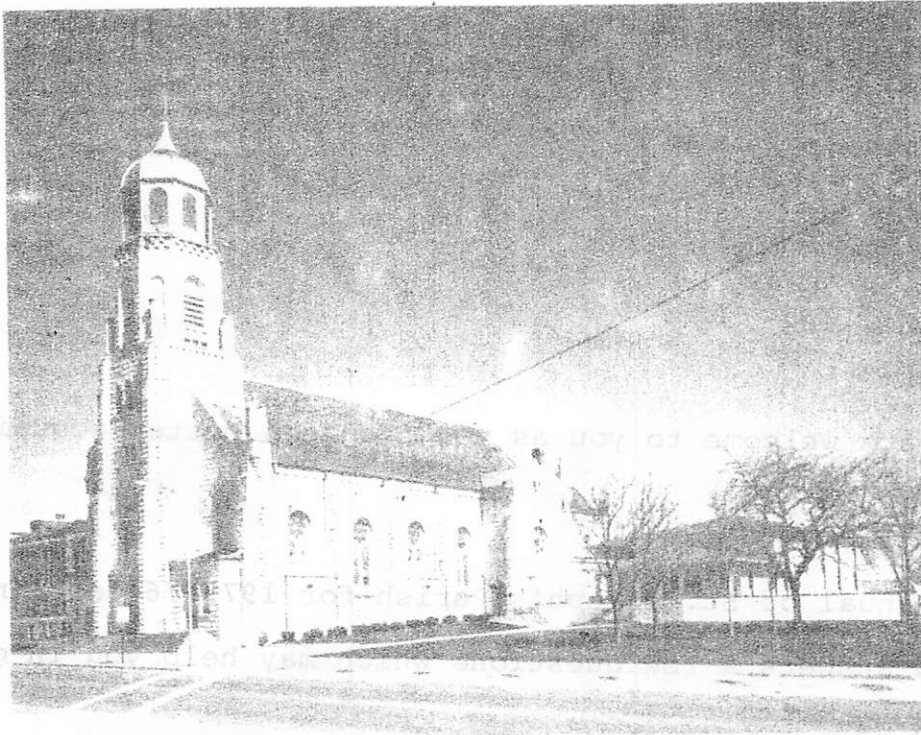

St. Francis.

The ever-popular saint, Francis of Assisi, has remained an attractive personality for more than 700 years. His "way of life" Christ-centered and outgoing, is the unifying spirit of the Capuchin Friars. The Capuchin movement began in Italy in 1528 under Fr. Matthew of Bascio when friars desiring to renew the vigor of Franciscanism established an autonomous branch of the Order. As Capuchin priests and brothers seek to transmit the Franciscan message, they do not limit themselves to any particular form of activity. Rather, they may be described as general practioners serving the needs of the Church. Today their apostolate is a varied,

flexible one involving many-sided activities such as:

PARISH WORK;
YOUTH COUNSELING;
HOSPITAL;
MILITARY;
COLLEGE and INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES;
URBAN SERVICES;
TEACHING; and
MISSIONARY WORK AT HOME AND ABROAD.

The friars who minister to St. Joseph's Church stand in a long line of faithful witnesses to this tradition of service.

The Capuchins came to Ellis County and took over St. Joseph's Parish in 1878.



SISTERS OF SAINT AGNES

The Congregation of the Sisters of St. Agnes grew out of sheer necessity to help the zealous Father Casper Rehrl, early Wisconsin missionary, in bringing the truths of the Faith to the younger members of his scattered flock throughout eastern and central Wisconsin. Realizing the need of Sisters, he turned to Europe for help, but received none. Then, returning by way of Rome, he stopped to pray at the tomb of the Little martyr St. Agnes. It is here that he received his inspiration to found a sisterhood of his own upon his return to Wisconsin.

The Congregation of St. Agnes was founded August 12, 1858. Then, in the summer of 1870, when it no longer seemed feasible for Father Rehrl to direct the small community, Father Francis Haas, a Capuchin, was asked to take the affairs of the Society into his hands, and undertake the spiritual guidance of the Sisters of St. Agnes. The Sisters came to St. Joseph Parish, Hays, August 15, 1880.

Since St. Francis of Assisi is one of the Sisters special patrons, and also since the Rule of this Congregation was written by one of his sons, it is a natural sequence that the humility and simplicity of this Saint seem to be the spirit of the Congregation of St. Agnes..

Apostolic and charitable activity belongs to the very nature of the religious life of the Congregation. Impelled by the love of Christ, the Sisters of St. Agnes serve the people of God wherever the Church needs them.

CELEBRATION OF THE LITURGY
AND OTHER RELIGIOUS SERVICES

SUNDAY MASSES:

(Saturday) 5:30 and 7:00 p.m. (Sunday) 6:30, 8:00, 10:00, 11:30 (Holy Days 12:05) and 7:00 p.m. The Sacred Heart Chapel is used to supply services when needed.

WEEKDAY MASSES:

6:30 a.m., 8:00 a.m., and 7:00 p.m.

HOME MASSES:

Arrangements made through the priest of your choice.

CONFESSIONS:

After every weekday Mass; Thursday before First Friday; and Saturday and Eves of Holy Days at 3:00 and 7:45 p.m.

BAPTISMS:

To help you parents and god-parents take an active part in the child's baptism and to make the event a memorable and meaningful experience, instructions are given on your obligations and a study of the baptismal ceremony. Baptisms: First and Third Sundays of every month. Pre-Baptism Instruction for parents and god-parents the day before baptism at 8:00 p.m., in the Parish Service Center.



COMMUNION FOR SICK:

Arrangements made through the priest of your choice.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK:

The Church wishes us to consider the Sacrament of the Sick as Christ and His apostles did. They used sacred anointing as a healing sign for body-soul, mental-physical ailments. The Sacrament, instituted by Christ, strengthens sick people to live good lives, and to bear patiently the cross of pain in any form; so it is not just for dying well, but for teaching the lesson of suffering in union with Christ. The elderly who are in poor health may be anointed and any serious illness is sufficient for receiving the Sacrament and may be received more than once at the judgement of the priest. During the year, we will celebrate communal anointings. Call one of the Fathers at 5-7356 to make arrangements.

MATRIMONY:

To avoid disappointment or change in your wedding plans, confirm your marriage date with one of the priests at least four months before you make any other definite arrangements. Couples planning marriage should have taken the full six sessions of a Pre-Cana

MATRIMONY (continued):

Program. If this has not been done and cannot be arranged before the wedding, provisions for private instructions must be made. If a party is under nineteen years of age a four month preparation period is necessary.

FUNERAL SERVICES:

In case of a death in the family, one of the priest will assist you in arranging for a funeral service and burial.

All requests for Announcements in the Sunday Bulletin must be typed or printed and brought to the Parish Service Center by 9:00 a.m., Thursday mornings.

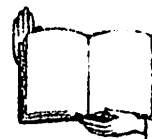
Brock's North Hill Chapel sponsors our Sunday Bulletin.

PARISH COUNCIL

The St. Joseph Parish Council was re-organized in the fall of 1972. The basic purpose and functions of our parish council are:

1. The purpose of the Parish Council is to involve all members of St. Joseph Congregation in the functioning of the spiritual and temporal activities of the parish.
2. To be a vehicle of communication between the religious and the laity of the parish and to encourage mutual assistance in the practical working out of the programs.
3. To assist in carrying out the aims and purpose of the Ordinary of the diocese of Salina.
4. To consider ways and means of increasing Christian influence within the Parish and its environs by cooperating with the Church Committee.
5. In general, to do all things necessary and proper to effect an energetic lay apostolate program within the parish.

Our Parish is divided into 17 equal areas and membership to the Council is to elect one councilman/councilwoman and one alternate from each area for a period of two years. Members from odd number areas are elected in odd number calendar years and members from even number areas are elected in even number calendar years to prevent a complete turnover of council members in one year.

A president, vice-president, and secretary are elected. We do not have a treasurer as our functions do not include finances and fund raising projects as such.

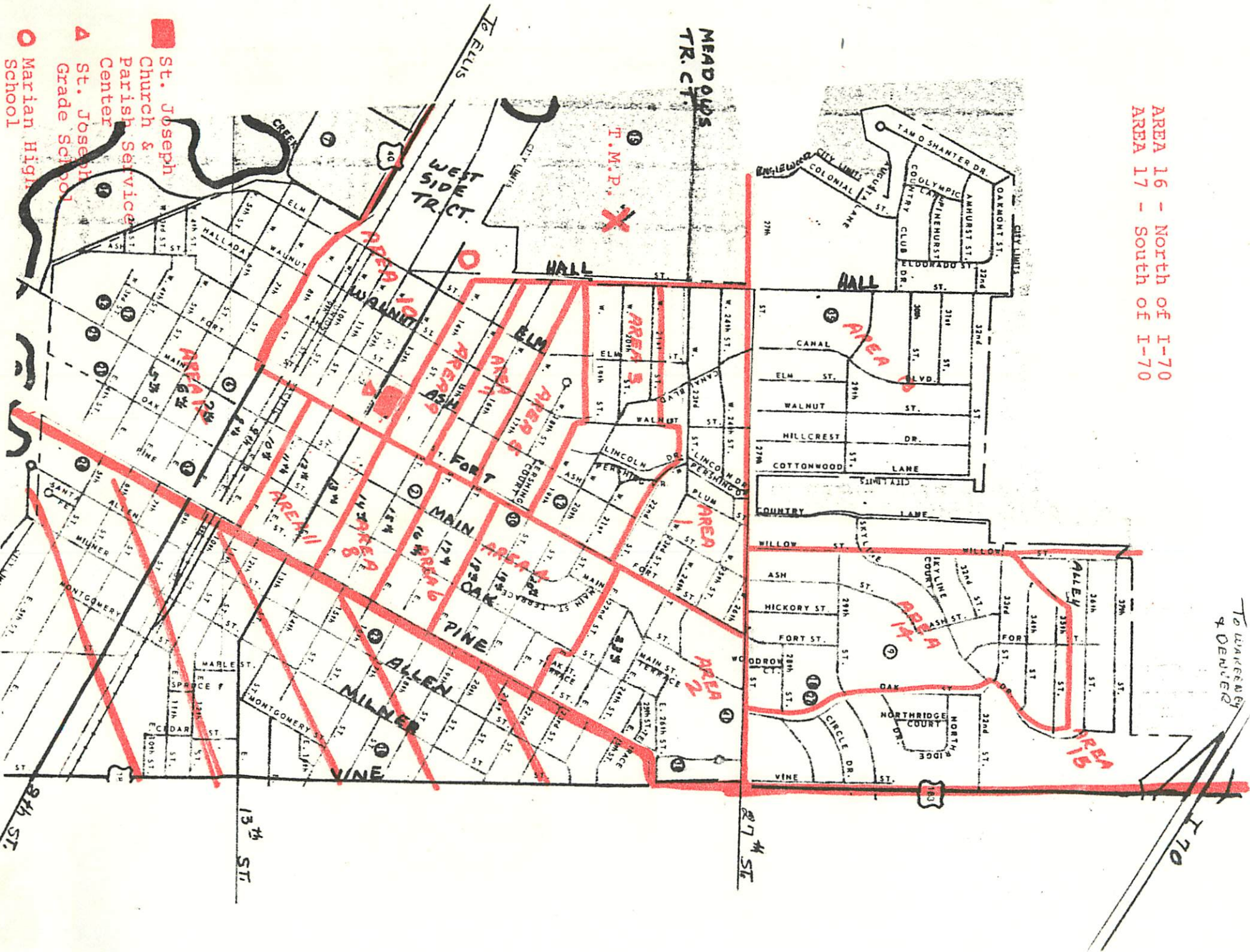
All meetings, which are now being held on the 2nd Thursday of each month, are open to all parishioners and they are encouraged to attend in order to help fill the object of a council.

Because we are partners in the priestly, prophetic and regal role of Christ, lay people share actively in the life and action of His Church. Within the communities of the Church their cooperation is so much needed that without it the apostolate of the pastors would be largely ineffectual...lay people offering their competencies...lend efficacy to the care of souls and even to the management of Church properties.

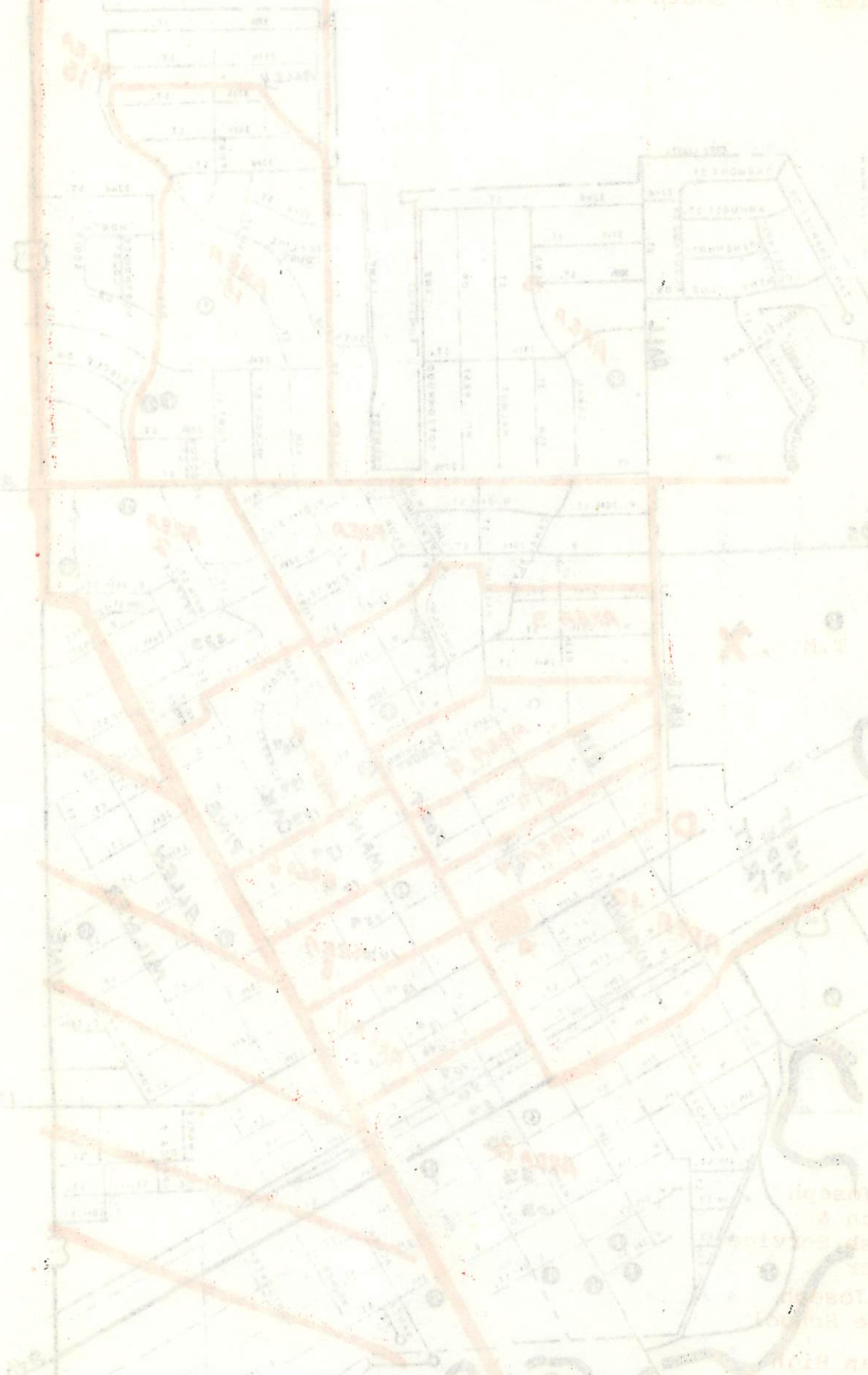

ST. JOSEPH'S RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM STRIVES TO...

1. Give academic religious instruction to clarify as well as motivate student Christian living.
2. Offer opportunities for growth in and understanding of Christian holiness through deeper appreciation of prayer and of liturgical experience, including confession.
3. Provide through discussions, insights and opportunities to put the Catholic Christian Faith into action.
4. Through group guidance to help facilitate assimilation of Christian values.
5. Offer in-depth instruction through professional teaching in religious education and to involve parental cooperation in team-teaching opportunities.

ST. JOSEPH'S RELIGIOUS EDUCATION - 1975-76:

Our religious education programs are effective because we feel we do have a clear idea of what we are trying to achieve...which is the process of freeing one to experience the Lord, to live our faith, allowing Jesus to BE for us what He truly is...our Saviour.

Through our religious education we hope to help build faith-community in our parish...an on-going process, but the only way to truly become God's family.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (continued):

Our programs have various needs and still our goal is the same---to make Christ the center of our lives. This is a life long growing, which means that religious education only ends once: at death and the resurrection to new life.

In order to help you to better understand what is available in our parish for helping you and your family in your religious education, we have a summary of all the programs in our parish, and what we envision in our education for the coming year.

PRE-BAPTISM INSTRUCTION:

Any parents wishing to have their child baptized are required to come with the godparents to an instruction on baptism - its meaning and responsibilities. Baptisms are on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month and the instruction will be given the Saturday evening before at 8:00 p.m. at the Parish Service Center.

PRE-SCHOOL:

This program is for four and five year old students. This year we will use THE JESUS STORY, which is a positive introduction to the central place of Jesus in life and faith. Since we want Jesus to be the center of our Christian world of attitudes and values, we want to share this with our children. We want to name God and His Son for them as soon as they become aware of their world. We anticipate that children will remain open to a loving God and a joyful faith.

Time: Sunday, 10:00 - 11:00 a.m. Place: Room 109 of Kennedy School

SPECIAL EDUCATION - MARY FRANCES MILLER R.E.A.C.H. PROGRAM:

This program is open to any handicapped person of Hays. We have welcomed persons of any Religion who are interested in learning more about God. This program is completely dependant upon volunteer work. Classes are held every Sunday in Kennedy School, from 10:00 - 11:00 a.m. The last Saturday evening of the month, a social will be held in the gym from 7:30 - 8:30 p.m. The last Sunday of the month a Special Mass will be offered in Sacred Heart Chapel, at 11:15 a.m. under the leadership of Fr. Charles Polifka, O.F.M. Capuchin.

ELEMENTARY RELIGIOUS EDUCATION -

DAILY PROGRAM: This program consists of various groups. Our daily program is for students of grades 5 through 8 at Kennedy School, from both St. Joseph's Parish and St. Mary's Parish, with about 385 attending on a regular basis. Because of many requests and practical reasons, and to meet the needs of teacher, students and parents, the text has been changed. We are using the Daughters of Saint Paul Series.. THE WAY, THE TRUTH, AND THE LIFE. These studies bring to the fore: doctrine, prayer, sacraments, scripture and liturgy, social awareness and love along with the commandments. Its aim is to provide parents, children and teachers with a clear statement of the Church's

teaching. We feel the use of this text, and more parent involvement will aid these students to see Christ as the center of their lives.

Time: Daily 8:00 - 8:40 a.m.
Place: Kennedy School

TUESDAY PROGRAM: This program is for students from grades 1 thru 6, who attend Washington, Lincoln and Wilson Schools. MY WAY TO GOD Series is used published by Our Sunday Visitor. With this program we want to give the students a complete overview of our Christian doctrine in a context geared to the students' level of development. Each year's program leads to a fuller understanding of the teachings of the Church. The children should have a sense of the continuity of God's love and works throughout salvation history.

Time: Tuesday 3:45 - 4:45 p.m.
Place: St. Joseph G.S. (Grades 1-5)
Room 111 (Grade 6)

JUNIOR HIGH PROGRAM:

The 7th and 8th grade students attending Junior High will be using the HI TIME SERIES, "Accent on You".

The emphasis is on Becoming a Moral Person. The material to be studied is based on the General Catechical Directory and presents God's Revelation as it is meaningful at a junior high stage in a person's development. Becoming a Moral Person hopefully will lead students into decision-making based on the principles of revelation. This series integrates the spirit of prayer and scripture search. This course aims at bringing the students to a closer relationship with Christ and living out this relationship.

Time: Wednesday 7:30 - 8:30 p.m. Place: Catholic Information Center

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM: - Wednesday 7:30 - 8:30 p.m. Place: Kennedy School

The aim of this program is to assist our youth in making an adult commitment to their faith. Freshmen take a look at how we form values for life. Sophomores seek the answer to the question: "Who is Christ, and what difference does he make in my life?" Juniors make an inquiry into the meaning of our Catholic faith and what we believe as Catholics. The Seniors explore the answers to important moral questions of our world and their lives and also explore the different type of life commitments open to them.



THE POWER OF INFLUENCE

- If a child lives with security, he learns to have faith.
- If a child lives with approval, he learns to like himself.
- If a child lives with acceptance and approval, he learns to love the whole world.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ST. JOSEPH'S CEMETERY:

1. The laws of the Church and State on Cemeteries and Burials must be observed.
2. Graves cannot be changed. No mounds over graves will be permitted.
3. Trees, flowers and shrubbery will be planted by the Cemetery. No permanent plantings are permitted.
4. Funeral designs and floral pieces will be removed when they become wilted.
5. Plans for monuments must be submitted for approval. Forms are available at the Parish Service Center. Monuments must be erected on suitable foundations approved by the caretaker. Vehicles are not to be used when the ground will be damaged.
6. Broken monuments or markers must be repaired or removed at once. Slabs will not be permitted as coverings over graves.
7. The right of easement grants only permission for burial under the above conditions. No one, even if an easement holder, may sell, barter, or exchange the cemetery lot.
8. The right of burial extends to the immediate family only, that is, to the father and mother and their children.
9. The cost of grave space is

\$75.00 per grave to parishioners,
\$150.00 to non-parishioners.

The other costs are:

Burial fee \$50.00 opening-closing charge,
vault placement fee; and
Five percent (5%) of the retail charge on a tombstone
erected in the cemetery,

as a perpetual care of St. Joseph's Cemetery.

OTHER PARISH ORGANIZATIONS AND ACTIVITIES

PRE-CANA PROGRAM:

Monthly meetings are held. Watch Sunday Bulletins for date, time and details.

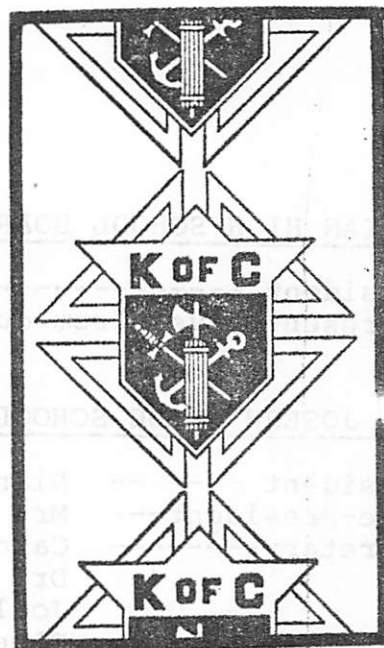
KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS: Announcements in Bulletin

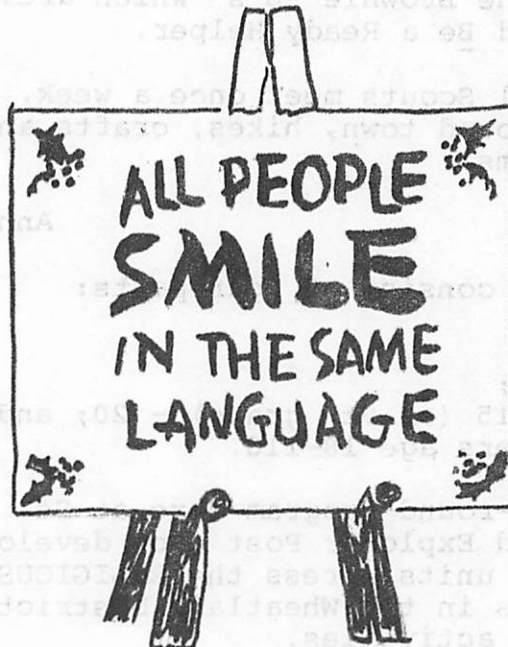

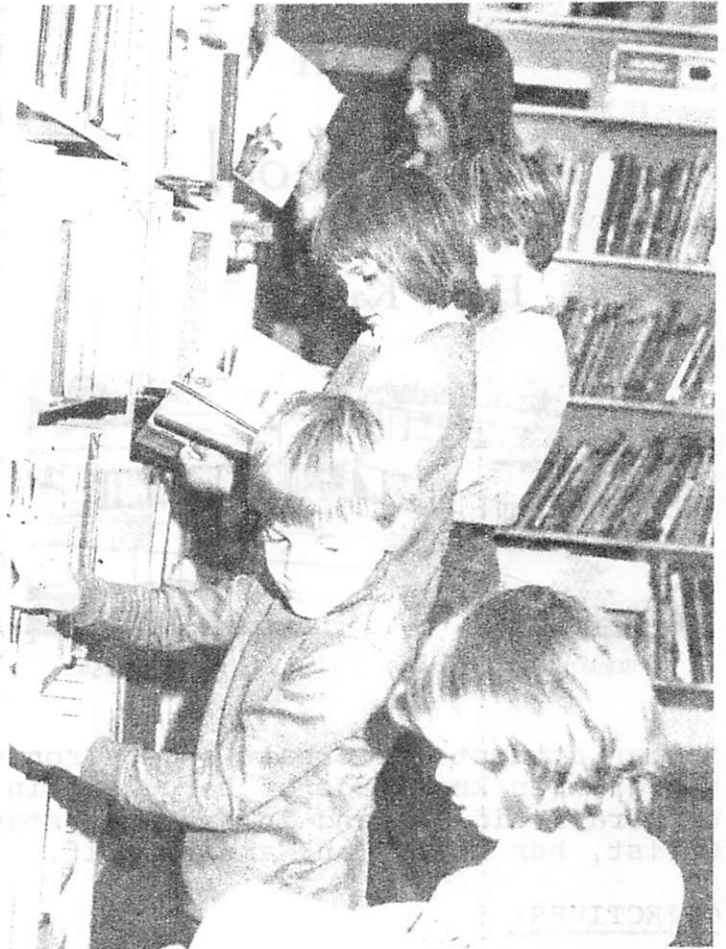

1. At St. Joseph's learning takes place in a joyful Christian environment. The classes actively participate in the parish liturgy once a week.

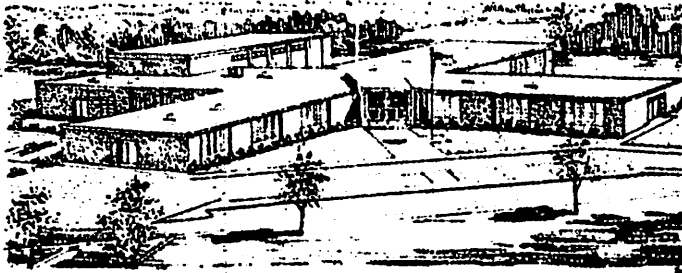

THOMAS MORE PREP (formerly St. Joseph's Military Academy):

Thomas More Prep began as Hays Catholic College in the building that later served as Girls Catholic High School and is now St. Joseph's Parochial School. As increased enrollment demanded larger facilities, the institution obtained its present site just west of the Hays City limits.

The present facilities were first used in 1931 at which time the school's name changed to St. Joseph's College and Military Academy.

In 1970, St. Joseph's and St. Francis Seminary, Victoria, were consolidated into a new type of school at Hays and the new name was assigned.

Thomas More Prep offers a four-year school college preparation curriculum. It is accredited by the Kansas State Board of Education and the North Central Association. The majority of the teaching personnel hold master's degrees.
