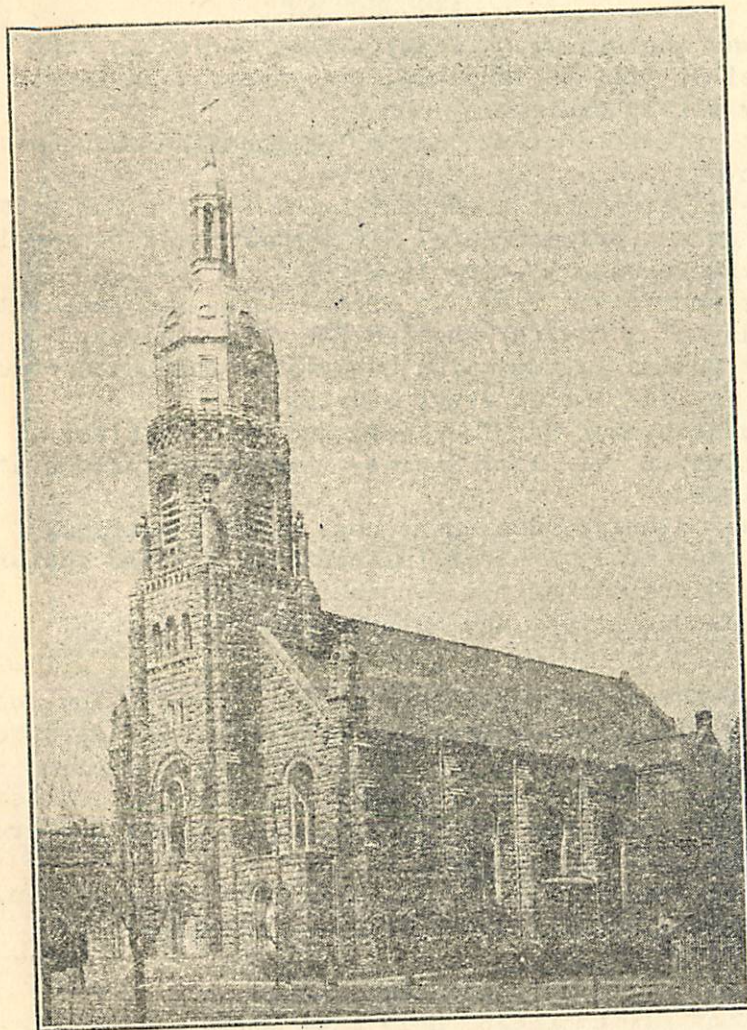
During this year of one's high school life, he knows that he goes to school for a purpose other than because he has to, but even so, he cannot fully realize the benefits that a Catholic school gives.
